Confidence Grows Quietly

That's enough.

If you're still waiting to feel completely confident before believing in yourself, you may be waiting for something that arrives so gradually you hardly notice it.

Perhaps confidence has already been growing beneath the surface.

In the way you greet a nervous client.

In the questions you now know to ask.

In the calm you've learned to bring into the treatment room.

In the countless small moments that have shaped the professional you're becoming.
